The Annual Report, An introduction.

Former Town Mayor, Gerry Pointon, presents the 2004 Annual Report.

I TAKE pleasure in presenting the Report of Town Council activities for the past year.

I will leave it to my colleagues who chair the Planning, Recreation and Finance and Tourism Committees to elaborate upon the activities of their Committees.

The Council met on six occasions and held its Annual Meeting on 12 May 2003.

This year, as a result of unfilled vacancies on the Castle Ward at the Elections in May the Town Council co-opted Mrs Joyce Clark and Mr Martin Mabey as Town Councillors for the vacant seats.

In addition, the Constitution of the Town Council was changed so that membership increased by two members to 17 Town Councillors. A complete list of Councillors and contact numbers is attached to this report.

In addition, a schedule showing the attendances of Town Councillors at meetings is also attached to this report.

Reward

The Town Council has considered the issue of payment of allowances to members as now permitted by new legislation.

The Town Council rejected the idea preferring no change to the present arrangement whereby Town Councillors give their time and services voluntarily without any financial reward whatsoever.

In October, our attention was drawn to the planned closure of the Sub Post Office at Westfields Avenue. As a matter of urgency the Town Council considered and adopted a motion opposing the closure and making a case for the Post Office to remain open.

Regrettably the Sub Post Office has now closed leaving the Town with only one Post Office in Market Street.

In December, the Town Council received a presentation from a Senior County Council official on the outcome of the Public Consultation exercise for the proposed Town Centre Enhancement Scheme.

The clear majority of those replying favoured two-way traffic proposals and the Town Council endorsed those findings and duly supported the two-way option.

Democratic

The Town Council also expressed the hope that the complete scheme can be completed without delay. I must say that this issue has clearly demonstrated to me that our democratic system, albeit flawed on occasions, is able to respond to changes when the need arises.

In February, we received Inspector Yallop the Ashby Local Policing Unit Commander, who gave a brief account on current policing matters affecting the Town. She also

responded to several questions from Town Councillors.

Inspector Yallop gave a most informative account and responded to Member's questions in a very positive manner.

At the last meeting, the Town Council considered the thorny subject of Community Support Officers. This is an arrangement whereby a trained individual would patrol the streets and carry out community support duties in the Town.

The Police, whilst supporting the concept, are unable to provide the necessary funds and instead invited the Town Council to underwrite the expenses of £25000 per annum for a full time official.

The Town Council declined the request and made the point that the duties of the Community Support Officer are primarily those of the Police and the costs should therefore be met from the Police budget.

It remains to be seen whether Ashby will receive a Community Support Officer but frankly I very much doubt it.

The Town Council has again had a very busy year as will be shown by the report of the Committee Chairmen. As Town Mayor, I am called upon to perform other duties as well as those of the Chairman of the Town Council.

Some of the highlights of these other duties were:

- *To represent the Town at an official visit to Pithiviers our twin town.*
- *To host an official visit by the High Sheriff of Leicestershire in November and*
- *A visit by the Deputy Lord Lieutenant to the Town on 16th April 2004*
- *To conduct fundraising for my official Charity, Glenfield Cardiac Unit, raising some £3000 this year.*

It has been a privilege and a pleasure to be Town Mayor of Ashby and I wish publicly to thank my colleague Town Councillors, the staff and not least my wife for the support given during the past 12 months. While it has been a busy year, it has also been very enjoyable.

Planning Committee Report

THE planning committee by its nature as a consultee to the planning authority North West Leicestershire District Council has had again a very busy year.

Attendance at meetings has been high by all councillors, the main theme of the work undertaken in the past has been the viewing & commenting on extensions and porches on private dwellings, but this year there has been a greater number of extensions many in the form of conservatories.

This underlines my committee's feelings that the residents of Ashby wish to enhance their properties by increasing the living area and remain in Ashby rather than move.

The committee dealt with nearly 300 applications and can be proud that they were diligent and professional in their decisions. We did on occasion feel that the District council planners did not agree with our opinions but that was mainly down to planning law, being the deciding factor.

On the 'business' side of the planning committee's work, we had in the main the task of agreeing to commercial properties having both renovation and modernisation work put before us.

This in the first light seems an easy task but we felt on occasions that some of the external work was not in keeping with what Ashby should be about and I am happy to say that the applicants eventually agreed with our views, and the work that was eventually undertaken has added to our town and its appearance.

We have at this present moment only three unused

commercial properties in the town centre, one of which has put plans before the committee, one that has just been vacated and one that has been un used for a number of years.

We have seen new business come to the town and take up the place of others that have mainly moved to larger premises, a pleasing point that some were retail and not banks or estate agents and also traders that neither Coalville or Swadlincote possess – these being the internet cafe. Also we are pleased that the HUB as finally opened to provide our youth another place to meet socially

I must add that now work has finished on certain developments, that we were sceptical about, have now shown that old and new can mix in Ashby.

I refer to the Bath Street development which has brought new trade and in town residents to Ashby and the housing on the old railway line. These schemes are a credit to the developers, builders & architects.

May I thank the Town Clerk and his staff for the work undertaken on the committees behalf both at meetings and collating the reports and plans, the councillors for their attendance and unbiased opinions and comments and finally my vice chair Gerry Pointon for his support and advice.

Recreation and Amenities Committee

THE Recreation and Amenities Committee, as its name implies, exists to provide and maintain recreational and sports facilities within the area served by the Town Council.

During the past year the full committee has met on six occasions. In addition there have been seven meetings of working parties formed by the main committee and I have met on a further 10 formal occasions with the Town Clerk to discuss relevant matters.

The Recreation and Amenities Committee is the largest spending committee of the Town Council with a total budget of some £160K. The majority of this, of course, goes to maintain our permanent grounds staff of four.

I would like to pay tribute at this time to the ground staff who work conscientiously to keep the town's recreational facilities in good order.

In order that these facilities are maintained at their best, the Town Council has recently formed a Standards Working Party to determine the standard to which they should be maintained. This will form a work plan for the grounds staff over the coming months and years.

On specific areas in the remit of the Recreation and Amenities Committee, I can report that work to complete the hard surface at the Skateboard Park is soon to be completed.

In the Bath Grounds the lease with the Bowls Club is now complete and the lease with the Cricket Club is agreed. Work is to proceed with securing the Bath Grounds from unauthorised vehicles access by closing the access from South Street (after the access to Johnson, Murkett and Hurst), restricting access beyond the end of the cricket area from the Station Road entrance, and protecting the grassed area from joy-riding cars.

Also the car parking area for cricket watchers is to be increased. The track across the Bath Grounds, previously used by the Bowls Club, has been returned to grass following the opening of the new access from Prior Park Road.

The Town Council is also seeking advice on the removal of the old brick Clock Tower in the Bath Grounds. You will be aware that the commemorative parts of the clock have been removed and the tower itself has been severely vandalised and it now presents, in my opinion, a hazard which would be best removed.

The planned cycle route through the allotments, which was to be constructed by the County Council with a contribution from the Town Council, will not now be provided by the County Council due to finding issues.

The Town Council is to enter into discussions with the Allotments Society and other interested parties to determine if this project should proceed in a reduced form.

There are still many projects with which the Recreation and Amenities Committee of the Town Council wish to proceed.

The maintenance of the many grassed areas and trees and shrubs within the town takes up all of our resources during the growing season, leaving a comparatively short time over the winter months to carry out these 'extra' tasks and we, therefore, never proceed as fast as I and the committee would like. However, these projects will be completed to the benefit of all.

My thanks to my Vice Chair, Chris Smith, for his help and advice over the past year and to our Town Clerk and also Pat and Anne in the office for their support.

Finance, Tourism and General Purposes Committee.

1. Committee Activities

I WOULD like to take this opportunity to mention two important ongoing initiatives in which the Committee has been involved. The first is our work on Quality Status for the Town Council.

This follows a decision made two years ago to support, in principle, Ashby Town Council seeking to become a 'Quality' Town Council. Now that more details are available as to what this would entail in practice, a Working Party has been set up to examine the implications of seeking Quality Status in terms of the requirements, the costs and the benefits.

The Working Party's conclusion, which has now been adopted by the Council, was that; 'It would serve the best interests of the town for the Town Council to meet the requirements to be designated as a Quality Council. Working towards Quality Status will: Provide additional services to the community (such as a Town Council website) Improve the Town Councils' communications and contacts with the local community, place the Council in a position to take on additional responsibilities for service provision should it decide to do so in the future Increase the Town Council's influence with the Principal Authorities (County and District)'.

The Town Council has therefore decided to seek to obtain Quality Status by mid April 2005. The Working Party has also suggested that a longer term goal of the Council should be to develop a Town Plan, to develop and set out the community's vision for Ashby's future.

The second important initiative is the Town Centre Partnership. This is a District Council led initiative which has taken a long time to come to fruition, following a period of public consultation two years ago. I'm very pleased to say that the Partnership is now well advanced in the process of being formed.

I believe very strongly that this is an important and positive development for Ashby as, for the first time, there will be a forum to bring together all parties interested in Ashby Town Centre. In particular, it has the potential to bring the three tiers of local government together, whilst also involving the business community and residents. This will give us the opportunity to tap into various alternative forms of financing previously unavailable to the Town Council.

We hope that one outcome can be additional car parking for Ashby financed through the Council's and the Leicester Shire's Partnership. My only regret is that, had the Partnership been formed a year earlier as originally planned, I think we could have avoided many of the problems experienced over the last year with regard to the one way/two way controversy.

2. Accounts

A synopsis of the accounts for last year and this year's budget are included with this report. The aspects I would like to mention here are the grants given to eligible organisations during last year, the status of our various funds and reserves and the level of precept this year.

2.1 Grants

To quote from the Council's Standing Orders, "Grants are available to any schemes which can be shown to directly benefit the Parish and/or the people of the Parish and to organisations which are open to all people of the Parish. Grants will not be made to political parties or to commercial concerns."

The chief beneficiary of grant aid this year was, as usual, the Museum, which received £7,500. The second biggest grant of £5,000 went to Change Ashby Now towards running 'The Hub'. This year, we decided that these two large beneficiaries should be subject to Service Level Agreements.

I am pleased to report that these were successfully negotiated and are now in force. This means that the Town Council has official representation on the governing bodies of the organisations and can expect them to deliver specified services to the public in return for their grants.

Other major beneficiaries of grant aid were Birmingham Children's Hospital (£500), the Royal Leicester Regiment (Museum appeal) £500, and the Ashby/Pithiviars Association, £300.

Grants were also made to Ashby Baptist Church, Ashby Darby and Joan Club, Ashby Summer Play Scheme, Ashby Youth for Christ, Leicestershire Crimestoppers, Macmillan Cancer Relief, Nursery Farm Residents' Association, Rotary Club and Westfields Tenants' Association Play Scheme.

2.2 Funds and Reserves

At the start of last financial year (April 03), the Council's total reserves stood at £128,602 compared with an expectation in last year's budget that they would be £125,245. This comprised £50,000 in the Recreation Fund (which is designated for future acquisition of recreational facilities), £8,000 in the Bath Grounds Fund, £12,000 earmarked for the Allotments Footpath/Cycleway scheme and £58,602 in General Reserves.

Last year's budget envisaged adding £25,000 to the Recreation fund and £5,000 to the Bath Grounds fund. Allowing for the budgeted income and expenditure over the year, it was anticipated that at the end of the year the reserves would be £143,726 in total, comprising £75,000 in the Recreation fund, £13,000 in the Baths Grounds Fund, £12,000 for the Allotments Footpath/Cycleway, with £43,726 in General Reserves.

During the 2003/4 financial year the Council decided to reduce the Recreation Fund by £16,000 to cover the cost of the new Bath Grounds Vehicle Access from Prior Park Road and by a further £7,000 to cover the cost of additional skateboard park tarmacking in Hood Park, leaving its closing position at the year end at £52,000. There was no reduction in the other earmarked special funds during the year.

When we set this year's budget in February 2004, we were concerned about the expected level of General Reserves at the start of this current financial year. We therefore decided, if necessary, to reallocate the Reserves at the outset of the year so as to increase the General Reserve to what was felt to be a prudent level of £43,700.

To do this would mean reducing the Recreation fund by £6,200 to £45,800. In fact this has not been necessary, as the General Reserves at the end of last year (March 2004) stood at nearly £35,000 better than forecast at Budget time. We also wanted to take account of revised priorities for the Council, particularly with regards to our ongoing Bath Grounds improvement programme and the need to work with the District Council and new Town Centre Partnership in improving the Town Centre.

Therefore, when we set the budget, we decided that we may have to reduce the Recreation fund further to £25,300, in order to increase the Bath Grounds Fund by £16,000 (of which £15,500 is likely to be spent), to add another £5,000 to the Allotments Footpath/Cycleway fund, bringing it to £17,000, and to start a new Town Centre Initiatives Fund with an initial contribution of £15,000.

In actual fact, due to the better than expected outcome at the end of the year, it has not proved necessary to reduce the Recreation fund as envisaged in the budget and the Council decided at its meeting on 10 May to maintain the Recreation fund at £52,000 leaving the starting position of the General Reserve for the 2004/5 financial year at £51,889

2.3 Precept

The overall picture for this financial year's budget is therefore as follows:

Total Budgeted Expenditure:	£284,530
Total Estimated Income before Precept:	£ 13,750

The Council decided to provide for the estimated net expenditure of £270,780 by raising the full amount from the Council Tax Precept, without changing the level of reserves. This has meant an £8,522 increase in Precept this year resulting in a 2.36% increase in the Town Council part of Council Tax per household.

We expect that the Town's General Reserves at the end of the year will be at least 15% of the Council's total annual expenditure.
